CHILD INITIATED WEEKS & NAIDOC (end Term 2)



The final 2 weeks of Term 2 encompassed child-initiated play, whilst the closing days included educator-led learning to coincide with NAIDOC.

The children's ongoing enthusiasm for STEM activities steered the various cooking activities (including making chocolate balls, cupcakes, biscuits, peach puffs and cake decorating). Additionally, the children employed their creativity

to produce huma bead designs and a decorative clay vase, whilst the formation of cloud dough offered an enjoyable sensory play experience.

The assorted physical play pursuits were prompted by the children's requests and included an obstacle course, t-ball, table tennis, markers up, AFL football and keep-it-up. The children were also introduced to Borna Jokee and Keentan (*Indigenous games*) which they learned were similar to dodgeball and keepings off, respectively.































Learning Outcomes -

- (1) Children and young people have a strong sense of Identity (children openly express their ideas, initiate and join in play experiences).
- (2) Educators plan experiences that broaden children and young people's perspectives and encourage appreciation of diversity).
- (3) Children and young people have a strong sense of Wellbeing (Children and young people show enthusiasm for participating in physical play).


